

UNINTERESTING STOCK MARKET

A Sluggish Upward Tendency on Light Dealings

LIMITED OPERATIONS

A Slow and Altogether Most Uninteresting Day on the Stock Exchange—Bank Statement Stiffened Prices, But Only Temporarily—Easy and Very Dull Closing.

New York, Oct. 14.—Opening prices in the stock market today moved sluggishly upward on light dealings, small fractional gains being the rule throughout.

General Electric gained nearly a point and American Tobacco preferred 1/4.

Trading operations were much restricted, and the market was about as uninteresting as could be. During the hours of business there were a number of usually active stocks in which there had been only one transaction made.

Reading, Union Pacific and Smelting eased off about half and steadied. Great Northern preferred, St. Louis and San Francisco preferred, American Tobacco preferred and Central Leather gained 1/4 point and Peoria and Eastern 1/4 point.

Prices stiffened slightly on the increase in surplus disclosed by the bank statement, but yielded again. Delaware and Hudson and American Car preferred rose 1/4 and Federal Mining 2/8. Pullman lost 1/4. The movement was very slight in either direction. The closing was easy and intensely dull.
