He has served continually as Director of E. T. V. & G. R. R. Company, for fifteen years. Col. Sanford is a man who has been the architect of his own fortune ; endowed by nature with great strength of mind and body, coupled with great business sagacity, he has by dint of hard work, won his way from comparative poverty to great affinence, and deservedly ranks among the foremost financiers and business men of
