THE PET OF THE GREAT E. T. V. AND G. R. R.

A Company of Business Giants--With \$800,000 Capital Supporting it--Who Some of its God-Fathers are.

[Special to the STATE CHRONICLE.] LENOIR, Tenn., July 10, 1890.--Many inquiries have been made of your correspondent as to who compose the syndicate that purchased the beautiful Lenoir estate situated on the main line of the East Tennessee, Virginia & Georgia Railroad, twenty three miles south-west of Knoxville and eighty eight miles north-east of Chattanooga.

Daily the question is asked: "What will be the policy of the company?" and "Who are to be the controlling spirits in guiding the destiny of the city of Lenoir proposed to be built."

I shall answer these many personal inquiries through your columns. A few months ago, the Lenoir estate was purchased by a syndicate composed of Gen. Samuel Thomas, Hon. John S. Brice, Col. C. M. McGehee, John G. Moore, Esq., E. R. Chapman, Esq., Oliver H. Payne, Esq., Col. E. J. Sanford, T. H. Heald, Esq., W. P. Chamberlain, Esq., A. J. Albers and C. M. McClung.

The Lenoir City Company has been organized with a capital stock of eight hundred thousand (\$800,000) dollars, with E. J. Sanford, President, and C. M. McClung, Secretary and Treasurer. Col. Sanford, Knoxville Tenn., is President of the Knoxville & Ohio Railroad, President Coal Creek Mining & Manufacturing Company, President Knoxville Woolen Mill and senior partner of Sanford, Chamberlain & Albers, wholesale druggists, Knoxville, Tenn. He has served continually as Director of E. T. V. & G. R. R. Company, for fifteen years. Col. Sanford is a man who has been the architect of his own fortune; endowed by nature with great strength of mind and body, coupled with great business sagacity, he has by dint of hard work, won his way from comparative poverty to great affluence, and deservedly ranks among the foremost financiers and business men of Tennessee.

C. M. McClung, the treasurer of the company, is a native of the city of Knoxville. For generations the McClung family have been among the foremost in the business and social life of that thrifty city. They have been noted for their intelligence, integrity and inviolable fidelity to every trust reposed in them. Mr. McClung is a fit representative of this family. He is at present at the head of the large wholesale hardware house of C. M. McClung & Co., of Knoxville, possibly the largest and most successful wholesale hardware establishment in the State of Tennessee.

It is unnecessary to speak of Hon. Calvin S. Brice, as he is a man of national reputation for political wisdom, business ability and vast wealth. General Samuel Thomas is president of the great East Tennessee, Virginia & Georgia railway system, which controls four thousand miles of road. Col. C. M. He desires to see his native State, Tennessee, blossom as the rose, and the city of Lenoir will get the benefit of his wise counsel, conservative judgment and great wealth.

J. Albers are members of the large firm of Sanford, Chamberlain & Albers, wholesale druggists, Knoxville, Tenn.

It can truthfully be said, that no development enterprise of similar character was ever organized in the South that started out under such favorable auspices, and controlled by such an array of business giants as those named above. It was the enterprise and judgment of these men, or some of them, that has built up the great East Tennessee, Virginia & Georgia railroad system, which under their fostering care has grown from a short trunk line in Tennessee to a great trunk line system, connecting New York and New Orleans with branches, reaching in almost every direction.

Nor has local development of the country through which their roads pass been neglected by them. By their unflinching zeal and constant exertion, a tide of immigration and capital has flowed Southward, building up towns and cities, and developing latent resources. Bristol, Johnson City, Morristown, Athens, Knoxville, Cleveland and Chattanooga, indeed all the towns along the line of the road, have felt the magic power of their mighty hand for good. Your correspondent speaks "EX CATHEDRA" but from all appearances, it can be safely said, that the young city of Lenoir starts off with all these advantages and will be the pet child of the E. T. V. & G. R. R. system. There is no more eligible point in all the South at which to build up a great manufacturing city. REX.
