First, in order that work now and here begun may be facilitated it is recommended that the governors of these States appoint several persons, one to investigate carefully each of the following subjects in its relations to immigration to that State, direct trade, labor and employment, mining, climatic and health, advertising and manufacturing; and these persons, under the direction of the Governor of that State, shall co-operate with him in such immigration work as he may direct.

Second, that for the purpose of general co-operative immigration work in all Southern States, the persons appointed as provided for above in the several states, to investigate each of the several subjects named, shall constitute a co-operative committee on each subject for the several States, and these committees shall hold meetings and publish such reports on special subjects as may be hereafter agreed upon and provided for by the Governors of the several States co-operating, or other accredited Representatives of these States. A number of other resolutions and papers were presented, including the draft of a letter prepared by Governor Fishback addressed to the President, all of which went to the committee on resolutions. Among the papers read were the following setting forth the resources of their respective States: By Gov. Fishback, by J. O. Waddill, of Georgia, (a paper prepared by Gov. Northern) and by Mr. Armistead, of Tennessee. Col. Nicholson, of Louisiana, presented a resolution requesting the government to further aid the various agricultural and mechanical colleges throughout the country. A recess was taken until four o'clock.

The convention reassembled at 4:20 p. m. when the chair stated that the general committee has appointed a sub-committee to prepare an address and that they were now engaged to that end. He announced that a recess would be taken for thirty minutes. The chair was resumed at 5:50 o'clock when the committee on resolutions through their chairman, Governor Stone, of Missouri, presented the address to the people of the United States and Europe, setting forth at considerable length the agricultural and commercial advantages of the Southern portion of the United States. The report was unanimously adopted. It was prepared as a substitute for and embodying the substance of various resolutions referred to the committee. The resolutions offered by Gov. Stone were then adopted thanking everybody in the city, the press included for courtesies received, and the convention, at 6:30 p. m., adjourned sine die.

SHAPE THE WORLD'S FAIR.
The Cosmopolitan Crowd Increasing Progress on the Woman's Building.
CHICAGO, April 13.—One of the immense locomotives that will stand on a pedestal outside the terminal depot at the World's Fair, to illustrate the latest advances in engineering, arrived at Jackson Park this morning. It is a Brooks engine, built for the Great Northern Railway, and weighs 197,000 pounds. It has twelve wheels, four of which are driving-wheels and coupled.

The Crown Laces lent to the Fair by Queen Margherita of Italy have arrived and will be placed on exhibition in the Woman's Building. They will be guarded night and day during the Exposition by Italian sailors.

The work at the Woman's Building is progressing very rapidly. Mrs. Charles Wadsworth, Miss Anna Roosevelt and Miss Carrie Dennis will have charge of the installation of the New York loan collection which is to be placed in the Woman's Building. The collection will be here on April 15. Miss Sackett is busy directing the installation of the Pratt Institute exhibit.

The New York woman's exhibit of the Training School for Nurses include eight important hospitals. This will also be placed in the Woman's Building, and Architect McKim has made a drawing for the general trained nurse exhibit. The paintings by New York women for exhibition in the Woman's Building are now on the way to Chicago.

Mrs. Walkins, Lady Manager for the District of Columbia, is superintending the erection of a striking pavilion in the Woman's Building. It will be an artistic structure draped with the flags of America and Spain, and in it will be displayed the "Isabella and Columbus Inlaid." This is a magnificent folio of illustrations descriptive of the discovery of America.

No country has sent a finer collection of books, both as regards quantity and quality, to the Women's building than Italy. This collection has been the result in a large measure of the personal efforts of Mrs. Alice Howard Cady, an American journalist, long resident in Italy. Mrs. Cady may almost be said to have inaugurated World's Fair work in Italy. She sent a circular throughout Italy, urging the participation of all Italian women in the Exposition, conducting her enterprises at her own personal expense.

Mrs. Cady will appear as the representative of Italian literature in the Congress. Seventeen Indians from Fort Rupert, Vancouver Island, arrived this morning at the World's Fair grounds, and they will be quartered in the ethnological exhibit, where they will erect a wooden house, totem-pole and all. There are ten men, five women and two papooses in the party, and they represent four tribes of the Quacqui nations. The men will row one of their native canoes on the southern lagoon, and the women will manufacture baskets and trinkets during the World's Fair season.
