TO THWART SCALPERS. A Ticket Dater Invented by a Savannah Man to Prevent Kerasures.

For a long time railroad men have been endeavoring to get a ticket dater and punch which would successfully thwart all attempts of ticket scalpers to erase or alter the date for the purpose of extending the time for which a ticket is sold.

The stamp is similar to an ordinary stamp, with the addition that at the same time it stamps on the ticket the name of the station, railroad and date of sale. It cuts through the cardboard the limiting dates in such a manner that it is impossible to change them without destroying the ticket altogether.

THE OLD AND THE NEW. The Administration of the City Affairs Turned Over to the New Board.

The closing of the city administration and the qualifying of the incoming elected board of aldermen took place yesterday in the Mayor's office.

Cases Disposed of By the Railroad Commission.

The Railroad Commission was in session yesterday and disposed of the following cases: Eugene Albee vs. Western Union Telegraph Company. In this case, which is now pending on appeal to the Supreme Court, the Commission having been informed that the defendant company was refusing to apply the rate fixed by the Commission from their offices at Elizabeth City and Edenton, have called the attention of the company through their attorneys, Messrs. Strong & Son to section 26 of the act constituting the Railroad Commission, and which requires the rates fixed by the Commission to be put in force pending the appeal to the Supreme Court.

Sparger Bros vs. Cape Fear and Yadin Valley Railway Co. This was a complaint that the defendant was requiring shippers to sign an unreasonable bill of lading. It appearing that the defendant has withdrawn said bill of lading and substituted one satisfactory to the complainant, the complaint was dismissed.

Citizens of Williamston vs. Albemarle and Raleigh Railway Co. This was a petition for better station facilities at Williamston and for improvement of the schedule. It appearing that the defendant has given instructions for compliance with the petition, said instructions are approved by the Commission.

Blackmer Beard et al to The Railroad. This was a petition by W. S. Blackmer and others asking that the Commissioners require the railroads to use greater care in handling baggage. It appearing that the prayer of the petitioners has been met by Circular No 26 of the Commission, the case was dismissed.
