The Sunday Opening Question.

CHICAGO, May 27 .- After a long conference held between District Attorney Milchrist and his assistants this a. m., it was decided to file a bill to enjoin the opening of the World's Fair with Clerk Burnham today. The bill-will be presented before Judges Jenkins and Gossip sitting in the United States Circuit Court.

Beyond setting the time for the hearing, no action will be taken, and the proceedings of the court will only occupy a few minutes. It was decided that the date for hear-

ing be set at such time next week as will be convenient for the sitting of Chief Justice Fuller The Jefferson Davis Funeral Car. The funeral car or catafalque which will convey the remains of President Davis from the Union station to the Capitol will be completed by Monday evening. It was built by Messrs. Ellington, Roystor & Co., after a drawing made by Mr. A. G. Eauer and is being draped by Mr. John W. Brown assisted by Mr. H. H. Roberts and Mr. Ed. S Brown. The car is fourteen feet high and will be the nost imposing structure of the zind ever seen in Raleigh. It is built after the Gothic style, having side and end gabels, supported by eight columns with the old style screens and entablatures. The dome is surmounted by a casket shaped tower. Its attractiveness is in the matchless harmony of its various parts. The car will be drawn by six black horses covered with black netting and driven by James H. Jones, colored, the body servant of the late President Davis. Each horse will be led by an ex-Confederate soldier in Confederate uniform. Four young girls, daughters of veterans, bearing Confederate flags will ride upon the car. The arrangement of the car is such that the casket containing the remains of Mr. Davis will be in full view to all along the line of march. Mr. Jno. W. Brown is sparing no pains or expense to make the car an imposing one and the Ladies Momorial Association did well when they put it into his hands. ALL BEING GOTTEN IN READINESS FOR THE JOURNEY.

Mr. Davis' Remains Transferred Their Final Casset and Borne to Memorial Hall-Richmond Preparing for the Reception of the Cortege.

TO STOP AT DANVIDLE.

WASHINGTON. D. C., May, 27 .-A slight change is to-day announced by the Richmond & Danville officials in the route to be followed by the Davis funeral train. After the stop at Raleigh, the train, instead of going direct via Keysville to Richmond, will return via Greensboro and Danville, stopping at the latter point, the last Capital of the Confederacy, long enough to give people of that city and sur-rounding country an opportunity to honor the dead chieftain. The funeral train will reach Danville about 7 p. m. on Tuesday, May the 30th.

New ORLEANS, May 27.-Early this morning the body of Jefferson Davis in its copper receptacle was transferred to a magnificent oak casket with heavy brass trimmings. The cedar coffin in which the remains originally rested was returned to the vault and it was closed with a marble slab upon which was a fac simile of the signature of Jefferson Davis, and it will remain in that condition as long as the tomb of the Army of Northern Virginia stands. 
