ANTHROPOLOGICAL SOCIETY.

A CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS ADOPTED.

An Important Organization which Should Meet with the Encouragement of the Entire State—An Appeal to all North Carolina Slaves.

For the purpose of collecting and preserving interesting and important historical relics and documents of the State of North Carolina which are being lost and destroyed, and even sent out of the State, a society has been organized at the State Capital.

The Governor has placed at the disposal of the society a suitable room for the care of such articles as may be given or loaned, and the State Librarian, Mr. Ellington, has kindly consented to act as custodian.

Proceedings of Last Meeting. Pursuant to adjournment the Society met in the Supreme Court room at 5:30 o'clock, on Thursday, June 15th, and was called to order by the President.

A Texas Bank Closes its Doors. WASHINGTON, June 17.—Comptroller Eekels was informed this morning that the City National Bank of Brownwood, Texas, capital \$150,000, had closed its doors.

A Serious Crevasse. NEW ORLEANS, May 17.—News of what may prove to be the most serious crevasse of the season at Bayou La Fourche reached the city yesterday afternoon in the shape of a telephone message from Napoleonville to the State Engineer.

A Reduction Demanded. CHICAGO, June 17.—At the session of the Typographical Union last evening by a vote of 76 to 10, it was decided to make a demand for a reduction of ten hours to a day for book and job printers to nine hours to go into effect November first.

Will Be Open Sundays. CHICAGO, June 17.—The Court of Appeals has unanimously decided in favor of opening on Sundays at the World's Fair. The court holds that the local directory is in full control, and that the government has no standing.

The Total Visible Supply of Cotton. NEW YORK, June 17.—The total visible supply of cotton for the world is 3,183,573 bales, of which 2,582,273 bales are American.

Weekly Bank Statement. NEW YORK, June 17.—The weekly statement of the associated banks is as follows: Reserve decrease, \$5,644,100; loans decrease, \$3,699,800; specie decrease, \$1,310,900; legal tenders decrease, \$7,330,500; deposits increase, \$12,339,200; circulation increase, \$37,000.

THE FORD'S THEATRE INQUEST.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Contractor Geo. W. Dant was severely condemned by the evidence given today at the coroner's inquest over the remains of Ford's Theatre victims, although some of those who gave testimony against his methods spoke highly of his ability as a practical mechanic and bricklayer.

Fatal Railway Accident. BALTIMORE, June 17.—In the collision of freight trains on the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, 38 miles east of Wheeling, W. Va., at an early hour this morning, fireman Fisher, of engine No. 1205, was killed, engineer Gebring was badly injured, and brakeman Adelsberger was fatally injured.

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A Fatal Railway Accident. ATLANTA, Ga., June 17.—The lightning express on the Western and Atlantic road ran into a freight train near Barlow, thirty miles from Atlanta, late last night, and killed C. O. Jackson, a train hand. Several others were hurt. Both trains were badly broken up.
