All that is specially commanded and all that is clearly to be inferred from these commandments. Certainly among them is the keeping of your covenant with the brethren; performing the promises made to each other as to the manner in which we will mutually serve God. In these are embodied, public service; private and family prayer; class meetings; comforting the poor and the needy; visiting the sick, and many others well known to the brethrennone of which you can neglect without bringing shame upon the sacred name of Christian, with which God has endowed
