While we realize the fact that Raleigh bas been afflicted by more or less of sickness this year, suil we also realize that there has been an exaggerated impression made throughout the State by newspaper reports which have gone out, and this has been largely due to the nature of some of the sad deaths which have accurred in our midst, some of the victims were persons who were known all over the State, and whose illness and death attracted wide spread interest in the State and general attention in the public prints. Thus it was that the sickness in Raleigh was held prominently up to public attention, while in other towns, where there might have been more cases of sickness, but among less prominent people, not so much attention was attracted by it.

Dr. Hines is a reputable and conscientions physician and speaks from official reports which he has and the testimonial coming from such a source is sufficient to settle the whole question.

Since then Mississippi has been free from the incubus of fear of the political ascendency of its most numerous but least competent citizens, and South Carolina will probably reach the same end by the same means.
