SECRETARY Carlisle has accepted an invitation to attend the annual dinner of the New York Chamber of Commerce on November 18th, next. He will deliver the principal address. It will be on "Sound Money."

The fact is settled that the fight between Corbett and Fitzsimmons will not come off in Texas or Arkansas, and there is a widespread belief that it will not come off anywhere. There is also a conviction that it was never intended to come off; but that the two bruisers were posturing for advertising purposes and for the money to be made out of the theatrical business and the sparring exhibitions throughout the country.

SAMUEL T. Childs of the Philadelphia board of education, who died last week at the age of 81, designed and made a clock expressly for the Philadelphia library, which is still in use there. Its works are so ingeniously arranged that it strikes only at sunset. The works are necessarily very intricate, as they account not only for the ordinary variation of the time of sunset during the different periods of the year, but also take in the changes of leap year.

As for many years past, the Post-office Department last year failed to make expenses. The outgo was \$98,790,173 and the income \$78,983,193, the difference being \$9,807,044. Receipts increased \$1,902,649, but expenditures increased \$2,467,708, so that equilibrium is still far out of sight. The chief item of expenditure is railroad mail transportation, \$26,429,747; postmasters get in salaries, \$16,079,508; clerks in offices, \$9,414,135; free delivery service, \$12,139,092; railway postal car service, \$2,946,989; postal car clerks, \$7,103,028; star-route service, \$5,763,579.

THE PAPER TRUST AND THE PAPERS.

The New York World, which is making a strong fight on the paper trust, which is about to be formed, makes the following timely observations upon the subject:

The newspapers of the country are not slow in meeting the issue forced on them by the formation of the Paper Trust. The promptness with which they declare their intention of resisting its exactions and preventing the white-paper trade from being monopolized shows that they are not likely to fall in energy where their earnestness is so thoroughly enlisted.

The prospect of a free market for paper was never so good as since the beginning of this attempt at monopoly. The existing tariff rate is practically that of the higher Republican tariffs preceding it. The paper duties, reduced to an ad valorem basis, run from 12 to 30 per cent. This is apparently a low rate, yet it is high enough to give American manufacturers control of the market, as is evident from the fact that in the eight months ending with August we imported only \$1,205,000 worth of German paper and only \$1,084,000 from all European countries combined. The imports of wood-pulp for the same period amounted to \$290,000. That the duty is not needed for "protection"

is proved by the fact that our mills export and sell at a profit in the foreign markets considerable quantities of news paper.

The removal of the duty will permit the building of mills in Canada to check the attempted monopoly. The people who have the brains and the capital needed to use paper have brains and capital enough to make it successfully, and they will do it before they will submit to an extortion which, if submitted to, would involve a decrease in the educational possibilities of the press of the entire country.
