This movement in favor of a short national campaign grows in favor. Chairman W. F. Harrity now announces that he is in favor of it.

The Savannah News ventures the opinion that it is to be presumed that the new Duke of Marlborough will be a leader of "society" on the other side.

Gen. FRED HOOD LEE was in Washington a day or two ago and in an interview said that he had no fear that the sweep of Republicanism would include the Old Dominion State and declare that the State will be Democratic in the presidential campaign.

JAMES B. CAMPBELL, the defeated Democratic candidate for Governor of Ohio, says that in the defeat there was really a victory, as the Democrats showed an increased vote, and that by next year they will be in position to wipe out the Republican majority entirely.

A young lady of Millan sued a man, a perfect stranger, for having kissed her on the street. When the case was called, the young lady entered the witness box to give her testimony, and the judge at once dismissed the defendant, declaring that she was so pretty that no man could be blamed for kissing her. The plaintiff was very much pleased with the ruling.

The South Carolina Constitutional Convention has adopted a provision giving employes of railroads the same rights as passengers to recover damages when injured in the service of railroads through the negligence of the company or their fellow employes. By another section all railroads operating in that State are required to secure charters from the State, although they are chartered in other States.

This Boston Herald is not too hide bound to express itself in favor of a Southern man for Vice-President, and says: "The proposition to put Governor-elect Bradley upon the Republican ticket for Vice-President is a good one. General Bradley is unquestionably an able man, and there would be no risk to the country with him in the presidency should the unfortunate experience of other years be repeated. He has fought a good fight and has deserved well of his party. He is very sound on the currency question, having made his campaign on an out and out advocacy of a gold standard for the country. It is time that the South was considered in the presidential ticket. The war of the rebellion is thirty years over, and a new generation has come up in that section of country.

We note that the State Department at Washington has received from Consul General Jernigan, at Shanghai, an interesting account of the four new treaty ports of China, which the Japanese have opened to the outside world. These ports are Chungking, Hangchow, Soochow, and She-tszu or She-shi. Mr. Jernigan points out the superior advantages of Chungking, but shows how difficult of access it is in the present slow methods of travel in China. Of Hangchow he says that the extension to that place of the railroad which runs from Shanghai to Soochow will bring it within a few hours communication with Shanghai. Soochow is only fifty-five miles from Shanghai and has water communication with the latter

port. The Emperor of China has recently given his consent to a joint proposition of the Viceroy Chang, of Nanking, and Gov. Choo, of Soochow, to connect it with Shanghai by railroads. "But," says Mr. Jernigan, "Chinese railway schemes have been heard of frequently and foreigners do not place much faith in such schemes until the lines are laid and the rolling stock is on the tracks." She-shi is little known to the maritime world, but it is a populous center of trade. It is on the line of steamers between Hongkong and Iohang, and it is said to have ten times the trade of the latter town.

Mr. Jernigan has received many compliments from both the domestic and foreign press upon his intelligent and able discharge of his official duties in China.
