EDITOR WATTERSON TURNS UPON CLEVELAND.

Editor Watterson, of the Louisville Courier-Journal, whose match less pen has been trenchantly wield el from time to time in defense of Mr. Cleveland, has at last rebelled and refuses to take his medicine. In a two column double-leaded editorial in the Courier-Journal he figuratively reads from the "Veiled Prophet" his veil, and then pours upon him vitriolic vials of scathing soorn. After saying in substance that Mr. Cleveland is a fraud and a humbug, that he has been a woful scourge to the Democratic party, and that he possesses no original opinions upon any economic subject, getting every thing at second hand by absorption, he continues with
