The Jail Overcrowding.

There are 67 prisoners in Wake county Jail. **Capt. Brooks** says this is three more than were ever in the jail at one previous time. The jail is running over with prisoners. There was many of them that it became necessary to put the female prisoners in rooms outside of the cell.

Ran a Still on Sunday.

James H. Bunn, of Nash county was given a hearing before United States Commissioner **Vitruvius Royster** today for working a government still on Sunday. On the evidence produced Commissioner Royster found Bunn guilty, and committed him to jail. Bunn has already been found guilty of the charge of keeping no records of his still at the present term of court.

Won Their Case.

Messrs. W. W. Barber and **R. B. Glenn** have been to Columbia, S. C., appear for **J. L. Whittington,** of Wilkes. About two years ago Mr. Whittington sold the Dispensary Commission of South Carolina several hundred gallons of whiskey, and when it reached that state it was seized by the government for alleged irregularities, and the case has been in court since that time, giving Mr. Whittington endless trouble. The replevants seized it in this State sometime before it was sold for the tax. Mr. Whittington being the purchaser. The case was finally disposed of last week and the whiskey comes back to its original owner at the expense of the government, which will also have to foot up the costs in the case.
