THE CONGRESSIONAL NOMINATION.

The friends of our esteemed and popular townsman, Mr. M. T. Leach, are urging his name for the Democratic nomination for Congress by the Convention of this, the Fourth Congressional District. Wake county will be solid for Mr. Leach, and he will prove a strong man for the nomination in other counties in the district. There is not a man in the district who would make a more able and acceptable representative than would Mr. Leach. He has always been a man of the people, and has studied public questions from a conscientious and patriotic standpoint. He is in full sympathy and accord with the Democratic policy of bimetallic currency and the free coinage of silver at the ratio of sixteen to one. He has fine powers as a speaker and if nominated and elected would reflect the highest credit upon the district which honored him. Nothing would afford more pleasure to the many friends he has, especially in this city and county, than to see this well deserved honor tendered to Mr. Leach. It is believed by his friends that Mr. Leach is one of the few men, who if nominated, could carry the district at this time, and it is believed that he would undoubtedly carry it.

Edison's latest invention, the vitascope, is attracting attention in Baltimore, where it is now being shown. The machine is the kinetoscope, enlarged so as to throw upon a screen life-sized pictures of men and women and scenes from nature, animated and forming an attractive life-like panorama. It consists of a small lens, such as is used in an ordinary camera, behind which is a metal frame about an inch and a half square, over which passes the picture to be reproduced. Behind this is a large lens and behind the lens is a strong arc light. The picture to be reproduced is photographed in all its phases on kinetoscope films. Each film is fifty feet long and contains several hundred minute pictures that go to make up the panorama. The film passes over a series of wheels propelled at a rapid rate by electricity and then goes in front of the arc light and between the lenses in such a manner that it is thrown upon the screen magnified 600 times. In this way an animated series of miniature pictures taken by the kinetoscope is thrown into one large animated picture on the screen. The first picture shown was that of two girls dancing with umbrellas. All the movements and smiles of the dancers were so carefully reproduced that a spectator could almost imagine the girls were before him in person. The second picture was a blacksmith shop, where four men worked to put a tire on a wheel. One worked the bellows, two were hammering on an anvil and one rolled the big wheel around. The corner of Twenty-third street and Broadway, New York, was shown, with people on the street and an elevated railroad train passing up the structure overhead and moving rapidly away. The fourth and last

picture was a young girl doing a skirt dance. In this the various color changes were given.

A wonderful book has just been issued by the office of public works of Paris, giving statistics of the industry for which that city is without any doubt or rival the most important place in the world—clothes. There are 9,500 dressmakers in Paris employing about 50,000 work-people. No one can even remotely calculate how much money is made by these artists; but the three first houses in Paris "turn over" about 5,000,000 francs a year each. Their profit on this is about 10 per cent, or about 500,000 francs a year each. In reality they make more than this, for in calculating the net profit, all personal expenses are deducted. On the other hand, an enormous number of bad debts have to be covered with. One dressmaker alone has 2,500,000 francs worth of debts on his books which he considers to be irrecoverable.

In connection with the East India exhibit in London is a Roentgen-ray side show and some curious experiments are being made. One man brought there a jewel box left him by will, according to the terms of which he was not to open till 1900. He wanted to see what was in it. In the cathode light the contents were plainly discernible. Another man brought a collection box wrenched from the wall of a church. The key had been lost and it was necessary to find how much money it contained. It was found possible to count the pennies.

No woman can ride a wheel in public in Bavaria unless she possesses a certificate of efficiency. Claim to a certificate is made by an exhibition of riding before police officials commissioned for the purpose. They pass upon the claimant to ride properly and issue the certificates.
