**The Committee and its Critics.**

The following from the editorial columns of the Charlotte Observer has our hearty approval and endorsement:

We are sure that a capital mistake has been made and that time will prove it, if it has not done so already, but we have made no intimation of dishonorable conduct on the part of the committee, nor has any other paper that we have read done so, though nine out of ten of them have protested against the committee's course, as they had a clear right to do.
