Warm Weather Predicted.

The center of high pressure is now over North Carolina and South Carolina, but it is also high over the Atlantic coast from Maine to Jacksonville.

An area of low pressure is central over Nebraska, Kansas and Iowa. This "low" is accompanied by rising temperature in the west.

This arrangement of pressure is very favorable for warmer weather over the Eastern and Southern portions of the country on Saturday. Southerly winds already prevail.

Light rains are reported from stations in Florida, South Carolina, and Alabama, and from the Northwestern states.
