

FUSION WINS IN WAKE

Mr. Broughton Led His Ticket. The republican ticket has won in the county by majorities reaching from one hundred and more to probably 1250.

JIM YOUNG'S SHAVE.

His Majority Will Not Be Over Fifty or Sixty—Populists Scratched Republican Nominations in the County.

The republican ticket has won in the county by majorities reaching from one hundred and more to probably 1250. Joe Rogers leads the ticket and Jim Young brought rear.

Jim Young claims the county by 117 votes. Joe Rogers' majority is estimated by populists to be 1,250. Jim Young's election is conceded.

Bryan carried the county by about four hundred majority and Russell carried it by a like number. McKinley carried the township by 191 majority; Watson's plurality was 34.

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BRYAN HAS THE STATE

Our Special Report. Governor Claimed by Both Sides.

SETTLE DEFEATED. The State Fusion Ticket Wins. Holton's Claims the State for McKinley.

The telegrams received today from all parts of the State indicate that Bryan's majority will be near ten thousand. The returns are more favorable to Watson today than last night.

Chairman Mainly firmly believes that Mr. Watson will receive a plurality of several thousands. Chairman Simmons is of the same opinion. The Republicans are claiming the earth.

The following returns were received today from the various counties: The reports were received largely through Democratic headquarters.

McKenzieburg gives 500 majority to county ticket and Watson, and Bryan 800. In Nash county the indications are that Bryan's majority is 1500.

Montgomery county gives the republicans 200 majority, a gain of 250 for Democracy. Union in Good Shape.

Union county gives Bryan 1,000 majority, Watson 200 and legislative ticket 200. This is a gain of 250 votes over that of '94.

Winston-Forsythe—Republicans carry 500 majority; more for Roosevelt in Right. Reports received by Chairman Mainly indicate 300 to 400 Democratic majority in Rockingham.

Camden republican. Camden county elects entire republican ticket by about 60 majority.

WINLEY'S SWEEP

Bryan Defeated by Overwhelming Odds. WEST AGAINST HIM.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 4.—Both branches of the next Congress will be controlled by the gold men. The lower house will have a safe Republican majority, while it would appear that after the new Senators have been chosen there will be a good Republican majority in the Senate.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 4.—The reports sent out that McKinley carried Tennessee seem to be erroneous. The state has gone for Bryan by twenty thousand.

LYCOLN, Neb., Nov. 4.—The indications are that Bryan will carry Nebraska, also that Holcomb, silver fusion candidate, is elected governor.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The New York members of the stock exchange did themselves today in celebration of the victory for gold. For an hour before the exchange opened, many of them assembled and began preparations for a genuine celebration.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The election of American securities had advanced from one to four and a half when the exchange opened. All the galleries and the office of the president were crowded with visitors.

When chairman McClure opened the exchange the scene was one the like of which was never before witnessed. Brokers shouted the prices and buying and selling went on with a rapidity which made the speculators wonder.

According to the general impression the election will result in a rapid diminution of the withdrawals of gold from the United States no doubt. McKinley's election has favorably affected the stock exchange throughout.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 4.—The returns are very incomplete, but it is known without doubt that St. Louis has given McKinley from twelve to twenty-five thousand plurality. There seems to be no doubt that two of the three representatives from St. Louis will be Republican.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 4.—The returns are incomplete from 28 counties out of 88 and indicate that McKinley's majority will be forty thousand.

RUMORS OF WAR.

Reports of Spanish Hostilities. A New York special of yesterday to the Washington Times says: A Herald special from Jacksonville, Fla., says Cuban leaders here in Key West declare that they have reliable information that the relations of the United States and Spain have reached a crisis.

Developments of great international importance in regard to Cuba may be expected within the next month. Advice here from Havana, are to the effect that the departure of Consul General Lee for Washington was caused by this crisis, and that his report to President Cleveland will be of such a character that it will almost certainly result in action being taken by the United States.

It is understood that the case of the Competitor prisoners was the immediate cause of the departure of Gen. Lee. The Spanish authorities had been disposed to proceed in a high handed way in regard to these prisoners, and without regard to treaty rights. Gen. Lee had not been advised by Capt. Gen. Weyler that the prisoners would be retried, but as soon as the consuls learned, unofficially, what was going on, and that the case had been called for military and not for civil consideration, they sent an energetic note to Capt. Gen. Weyler, protesting against any retrial not in accordance with treaty stipulation and entering objections to the proceedings, as inaugurated.

Capt. Gen. Weyler evaded making any direct response, pleading lack of authority to treat in diplomatic matters and questioning Gen. Lee's right to discuss matters which he had been the custom to submit to Madrid for settlement by the American minister and the Spanish foreign office. Gen. Lee then sent Capt. Gen. Weyler a second note, more urgent than the first, in which he reiterated his previous objections, and, in addition, strongly hinted that the irregular proceedings, if not remedied, would prevent the United States from recognizing in any way the validity of the new trial.

Capt. Gen. Weyler did not answer this note, but shortly afterward the court-martial proceedings, which had been instituted in Havana for the resumption of the case, were suspended.

The Eiffel Tower Bicycle Break. The San Francisco Examiner says: The Eiffel Tower bicycle, the newest sensation among the wheelmen of Europe, is a tandem and a few weeks ago the strange machine, with one of its wheels high in the air, made its appearance on the boulevards of the German city, and it is now being ridden in the same manner at the top of the tower is reached by a series of steps fixed to the rear frame post of the old bicycle. The rider on the lofty machine is in the propulsion of the wheel through a series of pedals, sprocket wheels, and a chain leading to the five wheel of the bicycle. Strange as it may appear, the wheel can be ridden up and down and over the ordinary county roads with as much ease and comfort as the regulation safety.

Purchasers Get Possession of the M. & N. Railroad. J. B. Glover and E. C. Spalding, and placing it under control of the purchasers of the property, the Atlanta, Knoxville and Northern Construction Company.
