MAY BE AN EXTRA SESSION.

There is talk of an extra session of Congress and it is said at Washington that an extra session is absolutely certain should this Congress fail to provide for the expenses of the government. There is no longer any concealment made of the fact that revenues are insufficient. An appeal will be made by the Republicans to have a revenue measure passed at the short session which begins in December. The only measure that could stand any chance of passage would be the Dingley tariff bill. That is through the House and now rests with the Finance Committee of the Senate. We are hearing now a good deal about the Dingley tariff bill. This bill passed the House on December 27, 1896, and was defeated in the Senate on February 26, 1896. It was entitled by its authors a bill "to temporarily increase revenue to meet the expenses of the government and provide against a deficiency." It proposed a horizontal increase of 15 per cent of the duties fixed in the Wilson tariff bill on all articles except sugar, woolen clothing and lumber. Wool was to be taken from the free list and subjected to a duty of 40 per cent of its value, and the duty on woolen goods was to be proportionately increased. Lumber also was to be taken from the free list and subjected to a duty of 15 per cent of its value. The duty on sugar was not to be increased. The Dingley bill was in effect a general tariff bill, affecting every article on the dutiable list except sugar, and adding wool and lumber to that list. It was explained that the bill was but a temporary measure, to last some two and a half years, or until a Republican should be elected President, after which event the duties would be put higher. An increase of 15 per cent, was described as altogether insufficient from the Republican point of view, but was as much as Mr. Cleveland could be expected to sanction. It was argued, and wholly inadequate as a measure of "protection." From the horizontal increase of 15 per cent, an increased revenue of \$15,000,000 was expected; the duty imposed on wool and woolens was counted upon to produce \$25,000,000 more, or enough to make the revenue of the government equal to its expenditure. During the past few days there has been quite a boom among the Populists for Mr. Bryan for United States Senator from the State of Washington. The Constitution of Washington provides that to be eligible to the office the candidate shall be merely an "inhabitant" of the State at the time of his election, so that the fused majority in the Legislature could elect Bryan in case he could be induced to go to the State. Free silver controls 84 out of 112 members of the Legislature. Rapid progress is being made by the President in the preparation of his last annual message to Congress.

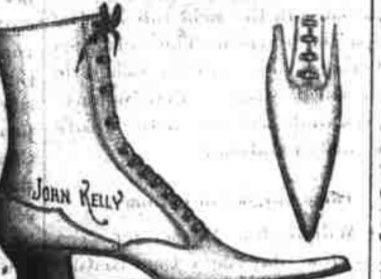
