londay, Nov. 16, 189 Nearly half of the 499 speeches which Mr. Beyan made in the last ampaign were delivered in eightyfive principal cities and towns of New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Kentucky, Maryland and Pennsylvania. A complete list of these eighty-five towns has been published in the New York World. Mr. Bryan delivered a greater number of speeches in Chicago than in any other city, and he drew the largest crowds there, but the vote shows a plurality of [56,543 against him. His next largest crowds were drawn in New York City, where the majority was about 21,000 against him, a democratic loss of 98,000 votes over four years ago. His largest crowds in New York state assembled in Albany, Buffalo and Rochester. More than 20,000 people heard him speak in each of these cities, and all gave unprecedented majorities against free silverafter hearing Mr. Bryan's arguments. The free-silver leadersrepublicans, populists and democrats-all agree that Mr. Bryan made the ablest presentation of their ease that could possibly have been made on the stump; that his campaign has never been equalled as a rsonal effort and is not likely to be soon again. More than 2,000,-000 voters were actually in the presence of the candidate, saw him and

heard him speak between July 10 and Nov. 3. Their enthusiasm was

tremendous, but the votes show that their reason was not convinced by

his pleading. On the night of November 17 or morning of November 18, according to an article in the New York Herald by M. Flammarion, the well known writer on astronomical subjects, a shower of meteors will be seen to emanate from the constellation Leo, not far from the star Zeta. A swarm of meteors numbering billions passes about the sun in a very elongated orbit once in thirty-three years and three months in a direction opposite o that of the earth. As a meteoric ust comes toward us with a speed of some 45,000 yards a second while we edvance toward it at a velocity of some 32,000 yards a second, the speed with which we encounter the "shooting stars" will be about 77,-000 yards a second. In passing through our atmosphere at a height of about a hundred miles above our heads they are heated white hot by friction with the thin air and are thus made visible. Some are consumed, or dissipated, in passing through our atmosphere, but others nass on into airless space and lose their heat and light. Ordinarily they are invisible, being very small more specks of dust. Together they constitute a vast group, or aries of groups, but are not den-
