His plan is to buy vessel, equip it and sail to the St. John, or Hermit Islands, in the South Pacific Ocean, where no inhabitants are left but South Sea Island belles, whose husbands and brothers have been killed in cannibal wars or taken away by conscienceless raiders. Capt. Bergman, of the American steamer Bonanza, recently sent the news of the peculiar condition of affairs on the Hermit Islands. He said his ship was blown out of its course and anchored close to one of the islands. The captain was astonished to see none but women on the coral reef. for the island was hardly more than that.
