

DIFFICULTY HOUSE FUND.

Confederate Veterans to Share a Great Affair Next Month.

A Covington (Ky.) dispatch says: The movement of the United Confederate Veterans to erect a memorial institute edifice is to be pressed during the coming year for speedy consummation. Gen. John C. Underwood, superintendent and secretary of the Confederate Memorial Association, has located offices here, and all communications and remittances are to be sent to him. The executive committee consists of chairman W. H. Jackson, Tennessee; Robert White, West Virginia; J. B. Biggs, Kentucky; L. S. Ross, Texas; and President W. D. Chipley, Florida.

The Fourth National Bank of Nashville is treasurer, and the executive offices will be at Nashville. Comrade Charles B. Rouse, of New York, has pledged to give \$100,000 as soon as the association raises an equal amount. The trustees and officers want to duplicate the Rouse \$100,000 fund in 1897, and then erect a memorial institute edifice, in which to preserve all Confederate relics and archives.

It is now urged by an official circular upon all division, brigade and camp commanders to provide for a money collection by every Confederate camp on January 19, the birth day of Gen. Robert E. Lee; and every effort will be made to have the Lee anniversary next month celebrated by a successful start in securing the duplicate of the Rouse fund.

Crumpler Coming.

The famous Crumpler has publicly announced his intention to pitch his tent in Fayetteville on the 23rd of January. Although he was located by the recent Methodist conference, he claims that he is not violating the rules when he goes in to another parish without invitation, because he carries his own house of worship along with him—his big tent.

This chief of the sanctificationists has just concluded a great meeting at Parkersburg, which is said to have shaken Sampson county to its very center. People flocked there from Cumberland, Moore, Harnets, Chatham, Brunswick, Bladen and even more distant counties.

On Christmas night some miscreants destroyed the splendid tent by cutting the canvas in shreds. The next night the meeting was held in open air, and a collection amounting to nearly one hundred dollars was taken up to replace it.—Fayetteville Observer.
