Persons informed that a large peanut oil factory has been erected at Norfolk, Va., are apt to ask what the oil is used for. It seems that it is already sold as a table oil, a base for soaps, and as a lubricant for connection makers of plug top and mainstems. Peanut meal will be refined for invalids, and the coarser material pressed into cakes for cattle. The humble peanut may yet restore wealth to the unproductive fields of Virginia and other parts of the south.

Mrs. Birdie Morgan, who has recently made formal application to enter as a soldier under the colors of the nation and the state of Colorado, has no intention of withdrawing her application. At the office of Mayor McMurry she reiterated her intention of joining the militia. In a joking manner one of the prominent city officials said that she would make an attractive appearance in the garb of a militia man. She replied that not only was her intention to become a soldier but more serious consideration of the matter had led her to believe that a company of women would prove an important adjunct to the national guard of the state.

According to a New York florist, the sale of Easter flowers amounted to more than \$200,000 in that city alone. Azaleas, ascension lilies and bulbous flowers, such as tulips, hyacinths and lilies of the valley, are mostly sought. The prices are very high, for, according to the florist, in no other business is the connection between demand and price so apparent. Sometimes there is such a glut in the flower market that it becomes necessary to sell surplus stock to street vendors. It often happens that 10,000 roses are sold in a day for \$10, and twenty-four hours later, when the demand suddenly renews, that number would bring \$1000.

The Queen of Greece is looked upon as a mother. Her tastes are simple, and her disposition most kindly. She has never got over her own great sorrow—the death of her eldest daughter, the Grand Duchess Paul, whose departure from Athens to be married was more like a funeral than the prance of a bridal. All Athens turned out to wish her joy. But the faces of the bride and mother were blistered with tears. This being thought a bad omen, the air was filled with lamentation. The princess was entreated by the women to turn back and wait for some propitious time to begin her journey. But the princess was married and was killed in less than two years by a fall from a carriage that was going at a furious pace.

Joseph Richardson, the eccentric millionaire of Harlem, N. Y., is dangerously ill. He is 84 years old and is reputed to be worth \$20,000,000. This fortune he made as a builder and contractor. Richardson's residence is one of the curiosities of Harlem. It is known as the "spite house," because it was built by the

old millionaire to spite one of his neighbors. The house is a four-story structure. It is only 5 feet wide and is 100 feet deep. The hallway is so narrow that two persons cannot pass one another therein. This strange residence was built some years ago. It occupies a narrow strip of ground which a neighbor wanted to buy from him for \$1,000. Richardson refused to sell it for less than \$5,000. This sum the neighbor would not pay, and the millionaire built the house, and has since occupied it as his home.

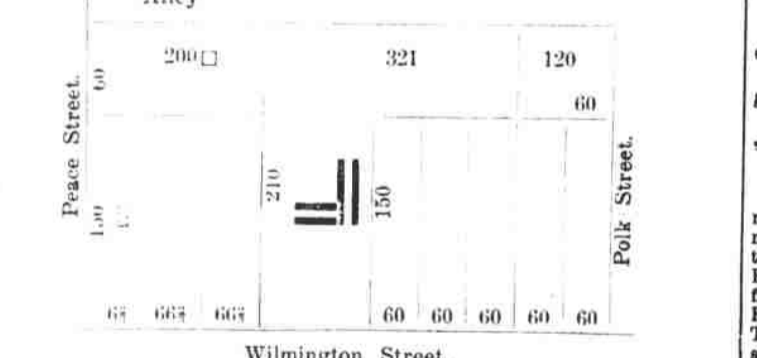
