A Baltimorean who has started to Klondyke with the intention of opening a barber shop is reported to have been in such a hurry that he didn't even put on his vest. If the weather is as cold in that country as it is reported to be, it is not probable that a barber, even a Baltimore barber, is in such demand as all that. A good set of whiskers ought to be worth a peck of gold dust when the thermometer is 68 degrees below zero.

Betsy Ross, who made the first American flag, is to have a monument; yet, strangely enough, it is not to be in Philadelphia, where Betsy lived and where the famous scene of the making of the flag under the eye of Washington is said to have occurred, but in Minneapolis. An Elizabeth Ross Monument Association has been incorporated, and subscriptions are coming in very encouragingly. The sum to be raised is \$100,000, and among those who have already promised to contribute are President McKinley and Vice-President Hobart.

The discussion in connection with the renewal of the charter of the Bank of France, which has just been prolonged by the National League until the end of 1920, has brought to light the measures that were adopted during the war of 1870 for the preservation of the specie and valuables confided to the care of the institution to the extent of over \$100,000,000. It seems, says the New York Tribune, that the whole of this treasure was packed into some twenty-five thousand cases, marked "explosive projectiles," and was shipped by rail to Brest, where it was "cached" in such a manner in the arsenal that, had even the Germans captured the port, they would never have discovered the hiding place. Indeed, so elaborate were the precautions adopted that neither the people who shipped the cases from Paris nor those who concealed them at Brest had any idea of the contents of the boxes.

The Engineering and Mining Journal says: The opening of a new coal field in Great Britain is a matter of considerable importance to that country. It might be supposed that the coal measures of that country had been pretty thoroughly explored, and that its resources were fully known, but the discoveries now made show that at least one field of some extent was left. The new workings are in Kent, in the extreme southern part of England, bordering on the channel, which separates the island from France. Geologists have long asserted the probable existence of coal there, but it is only a short time since actual exploration work was begun. The shafts sunk have now reached a point where the existence of workable coal measures is proved, and it is believed that the new mines will furnish a desirable addition to the coal supply of the country. The nature of the coal and the geological conditions indicate that it is probably a continuation of the seams which

are extensively worked in the basin of the Pas-du-Calais, in northern France. The Kent coal is nearer London than that of any other district, and that fact will give the mines an advantage in supplying the market of the city, since the question of freights is even more important there than here, owing to the higher rates of freight charged on the English railroads and the greater differences in them due to distance.
