The white citizens of the city armed themselves and were prepared for an outbreak atanytime, Twentyfive to fifty members of the military companies assembled at eith r armory, prepared to respond promptly if needed

On one street a crowd of negroes. estimated at two or three hundred, were congregated. A colored band was assembled with them.

A few white citizens of the place and members of the police force gave them notice that the crowd must disperse. This request was, to a certain extent, complied with, many of them leaving the streets. but the soldiers remained around the armories through the night as a precaution.

Further trouble is anticipated.

Condemned Man Puts The Gallows Behind Him.

ESCAPED TODAY.

Was To Have Been Hanged Next Week-Got Out of the Dekalb Juil by Climbing Over Gallows Which

Planagan, who murdered three persons a little over a year ago and who was tried, convicted and sentenced to be hanged next week, escaped from Dekalb county jail at Decatur this morning.
