ONE OF THE GREATEST DEBATES IN HISTORY.

After the peace of 1763 the British Ministry attempted to lay a direct internal tax upon the colonies.

This was the first muttering of an approaching storm. Its significance was seen by Franklin and other agents of the colonies in England, and in a few months the colonies were filled with indignation and alarm.

The Stamp Act provided that all business documents and instruments such as deeds, wills, leases, all papers in legal proceedings, writs, warrants, licenses, and even college degrees, should be null and void unless written on stamped paper furnished by the Government and sold by stamp officers. The act was to go into effect on November 1, 1765.

There was then a great debate. Charles Townshend, on the Government side, supported the bill with a speech in which he said: "Now will these Americans—children planted by our care, nourished up by our indulgence, and protected by our arms—will they grudge to contribute their mite to relieve us from the heavy weight of that burden which we lie under?"

To this appeal Colonel Barre, a friend of America in the House of Commons, replied in this eloquent strain:

"They planted by your care! No! Your oppression planted them in America! Fled from your tyranny to a then uncultivated and inhospitable country, where they exposed themselves to almost all the hardships to which human nature is liable, and yet, actuated by principles of true English liberty, they met all hardships with pleasure, compared with those they suffered in their own country, from the hands of those who should have been their friends.

They nourished up by your indulgence! They grew by your neglect of them. As soon as you began to care for them, that care was exercised in sending persons to rule them, to spy out their liberties, to misrepresent their actions, and to prey upon them—men whose behavior on many occasions has caused the blood of those sons of liberty to recoil within them.

They protected by your arms! They have nobly taken up arms in your defence, have exerted their valor, amidst their constant and laborious industry, for the defence of a country whose frontier was drenched in blood.

The Stamp Act was passed in the House of Commons by a vote of 204 to 42, on March 22, 1764. The night after the passage of the Stamp Act, which has been called a "monument of ministerial folly," Franklin wrote to Charles Thompson, afterward secretary of congress, as follows: "The sun of liberty is set; you must light up the candles of industry and economy." Mr. Thompson replied, in the spirit of the Revolution: "Be assured we shall light up torches of another sort."—From "The Preliminary Period of the Revolution," in Godley's Magazine for January.
