NEWSPAPER CHARITY.

The newspapers of this country are subjected now and then to criticisms and even to abuse by persons who, though they have never attempted to conduct any newspaper, are absolutely certain that they know just how all newspapers should be managed.

But it is admitted even by the most narrow and unfair censors of newspapers that they are not always vicious; that sometimes they do helpful and noble things.

Newspapers all over the country are famous for their readiness to help the unfortunate and suffering, for their earnest and effective work in the cause of charity.

The Raleigh Record, when it found that there was a coal trust in this city which charged unreasonable prices, and, worse than that, gave short weight, established a yard of its own from which coal was supplied at absolute cost. In this way it added to the comfort of those who work in the poor and the people of moderate means in Philadelphia.

The New York Herald has for many years past raised a free school which has been of untold benefit to the poor of the metropolis.

The New York Tribune gives every summer a series of excursions to poor children.

Mr. Joseph Pulitzer, of the World, has given several dinners to the poor on Thanksgiving day and Christmas, of which many thousands partook. Besides this he has endowed beds in hospitals and established schools for newsboys.

The Washington Star gives at its own expense a superb musical entertainment every Christmas, to which the price of admission is at least one pound of some sort of food, and there is no limit to the number of pounds any person may contribute. The entire proceeds are given to the poor of the city, and the proceeds are always very large.

The New Orleans Times-Democrat has a noble habit of presenting a doll each Christmas to every poor child in that city. It announces that it will carry out this beautiful enterprise this year on a larger scale than ever. Hundreds, probably thousands, of children in New Orleans will thus receive a Christmas doll who would never have gotten that or any Christmas present but for the Times-Democrat.

It is a grand thing to be the Santa Claus of those who would be passed by the regular distributor of Christmas gifts and joys. We take our hat off to our New Orleans contemporary and hope that the number of such big-hearted newspapers may increase.
