

CONVICTS AT AUCTION.

Prisoners Sold to Highest Bidders at West Palm Beach, Fla.

A dispatch to the New York Herald Jan. 6th from West Palm Beach, Fla., says: The state of Florida today auctioned off 410 human beings—convicts.

The convicts were in charge of fifty guards, armed with revolvers, rifles and whips. A rough stockade had been erected inclosing an acre.

The men were miserably clothed and most of them were emaciated and thin. Their old employers had gotten all they could out of them here with the cheapest of outfits in the way of clothing. The women had only a single skirt. Nearly all were bare-headed.

The auctioneer, "Lack" Gundy, called the bidders to the front at 10 o'clock and began the sale. The bidders had inspected the convicts as if they were cattle. The bidding was different from auctions generally. One man would bid for ten men, and if no one else bid higher he had the choice.

William Stover of Fort Pierce bid in the first ten men. To the negroes the sale seemed a sort of picnic, but the whites shuffled forward, most of them with downcast faces and limping gait. Others boldly faced the crowd, and seemed to lay indifference to the scene. Men having a record for even tempers were first chosen, while the unruly ones were the last to go.

After the able-bodied men all had been disposed of the boys were chosen, the women and girls going last. There were only ten white women in the crowd, and they were most miserable creatures, hollow eyed, wan and salow. They were in for two years, most of them and they secured fairly good masters, according to the way things were. A bystander, a rich man from New York, it is said, bought two boys and liberated them. His name could not be obtained.

The convicts will probably have an easier time than heretofore, as the men on the east coast will have better care of them. The turpentine camps in the western part of Florida where the convicts had been were miserable, and from stories told by some of the men, death was a welcome release. They were kept at work from day night until dark in chains, fed only cheap slabs and then upon the cheapest and the poorest food. They will now be employed on the big pineapple plantations, orange groves and gardens and on railroad work and canal cutting near Lake Worth.
