NOW IN NORFOLK JAIL.

Last night a gentleman arrived in this city from Norfolk and informed Mr. Watts and Mr. Denton that he saw Langdon in Norfolk and spent some time with him on a previous night.

Mr. Denton had previously notified the authorities at Norfolk to be on the lookout for Langdon.

Early this morning Chief of Police Norfolk received a telegram from the Chief at Norfolk saying: "Langdon under arrest. He will return without papers. Stand by him."

Special Officer Alfonso Haynes was sent to Norfolk on the 11:30 mail this morning. He will probably return with the prisoner tomorrow afternoon.

James C. Langdon came to Raleigh about the time the Wilbur-Kirwin Opera Company began their last engagement in this city.

Langdon, alias Lang, tried to keep his destination a secret when he left.

FORGER LEWIS CALUGHT.

The Crook Who Adopted Gov. Scales' Name Caught at Madison.

Wentworth, N. C., Feb. 24.—The alleged "crook," Robert P. Lewis, who has been "operating" under the name of the late Gov. A. M. Scales, of Greensboro, and State Senator Scales, of the same name, was arrested at Madison and is now safely lodged in the county jail at this place to await the coming of the Texas sheriff who wants him for alleged forgery in that State.

It is thought now that Lewis has been around here among his kin folks for some time, probably ever since he left Keyaville.

The sheriff from Paris, Texas, is already on his way to North Carolina after Lewis.

It is thought that Lewis stayed in the woods last night and had gone to meet his breakfast just when the officers came up on him and had levelled on him with their guns before he saw them.

Lewis is wanted in Texas for forgery and jumped his bail bond, and the present arrest is at the instance of his bondsmen who has had to suffer on his account.
