AN EX-CAPTAIN DEAD!

By President Davis Passes Peacefully Away.

DEATH IN SORROW AND MOURNING.

of Mr Mast at Raleigh.

Intelligence reached this morning that Hon Jefferson Davis, Ex-President of the Confederate States, died at the residence of Mr J W Payne, his lifelong friend, in New Orleans this morning at 12:45 o'clock.

The death of this distinguished gentleman will cast a gloom of sorrow throughout the entire South. His life has been so prominent and so notorious that no sketch is needed to revive the events of the past. Throughout the civilized world his name is a household word. The dispatch was received here at 11:45 and the city bell was at once tolled and other demonstrations of sorrow exhibited. The flags on the Capitol and city hall were placed at half mast and preparations are being made for draping the public city and State buildings in mourning.

The Governor this afternoon issued the following:

MEMORIAL PROCLAMATION.

State of North Carolina, Executive Department.

WHEREAS: Almighty God by His Providence hath removed from this world Jefferson Davis, the trusted leader of the people of the State of North Carolina in the four darkest years of her history, and

WHEREAS: Our entire people regard his memory with feelings of the highest respect, esteem and affection, now for the purpose of manifesting their appreciation of his exalted character and distinguished services, I, Daniel G Fowle, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by this, my Proclamation do enjoin upon the people of this State laying aside all business

to assemble themselves together at their respective places of worship at the time to be appointed for the funeral of Mr Davis, and to join in memorial services suitable to such a sad occasion.
