ANOTHER FOINT RAISED.
Mr. W. R. Henry of Counsel for White and Cross Makes Another Effort for his Clients.

Mr W R Henry, of counsel for Messrs Cross and White has raised another point in behalf of his elients. He returned, yestereday, from New Berne where he presented for the $f$ the United States District court, petition for a writ of habeas corpus in the name of CE Cross. The poin raised by Mr Henry is that the agree hile in Canads plases and in the same position and secures to same position and secures to them the regularly extradited; that hading in the same position they could not be tried for any other offense than that for which extradited until allowed an opportunity to return to Canada.
