New Trinity College.

The building committee have held a meeting at Durham and determined that the new building for Trinity College shall be a three story structure, 200 feet long by 50 feet deep, with wings 50x50 feet at each end, the whole forming three sides of a hollow square, measuring 200 feet in front and 100 feet on each of the other sides, with hall ways not less than 13 nor more than 16 feet wide running through the main building and the wings. The building will be three full stories high above the basement, and the chapel will be in the second story. There will be three bath rooms on the second floor and three on the third.

BAPTIST TABERNACLE.

The whole number of scholars enrolled at the Sunday school of this church yesterday, reached six hundred and nineteen—twelve new scholars. The school is growing very rapidly in members and usefulness. It was decided, yesterday, to have a picnic, this year, only five voting against it. The place will be selected in the future. At the morning service the house was well filled. The sermon was preached by the pastor, Rev J J Hall, the subject being "Life in Abundance"—text, John 10th chapter, latter part of 10th verse. It was a discourse of great power and well handled by the eloquent divine. He said that all life owes its origin to Christ. That Jesus came that they might have life and that they might have life more abundantly. He said, he had seen persons, whom he believed had been blessed with this life, who seem to have never gotten beyond the baby days of their whining and complaining. It is in the power of every one to have this life and to have it more abundantly—only look to Jesus with trusting hearts.

His sermon in the evening to young men, was one of great power. The vast audience room was filled to overflowing—a brief synopsis of it would do it injustice. You must hear the Rev Mr Hall if you would get the benefit of his able and eloquent sermon. We regret that every young man in the city did not hear him last night, his appeal to the young men for a higher life was eloquent and convincing.
