The Mennonites' custom of washing feet was observed yesterday morning in the hall over the Old Town Bank. About fifty persons attended. The sermon was delivered by Jacob S Lehman, of Chambersburg, Pa. During the service he removed his coat, shoes and stockings, placed a towel around his waist and immersed his feet in a small tub of water that sat on the platform. Upon withdrawing them one of the male members of the order wiped and dried them with the towel. The preacher in turn washed the feet of about ten men. Fifteen ladies also observed the same ceremony among themselves. The washing of feet is in obedience to the command to love one another. The Mennonites do not fight in wars, sue at law, nor follow modern fashions of dress. Their clothing is severely plain.
