Second class: Mrs M A Towles, \$58; J P Wray, \$100; G N Waitt, \$175; L Grief & Bro, Baltimore, \$425; J & H Mann & Co, \$1,825.

All other claims are private. The total assets have not been estimated, nor have the total liabilities.

Mr Waitt's misfortune causes deep regret in the community, and the hope is expressed that he may be able to successfully tide over his difficulties and resume business.
