THE NEWS.

Two locomotives collided on the railroad bridge of Cincinnati, Friday night, and both plunged thirty five feet into the river below. No one was injured.

Fritz Dubois was hanged in the jail yard at Quebec, Canada, Friday, for the murder in February last of his wife, his two little children and his mother in law.

Severe electrical storms, with heavy rain, passed over Missouri on Friday night. Several houses were struck by lightning and one man was killed in St Joe.

The flint glass workers have presented their scale of wages for the ensuing year to the Pittsburg manufacturers. The scale advanced wages about twelve per cent.

Fire Thursday night destroyed a row of five stores in Apalachicola. Four firms were burned out, entailing an aggregate loss of \$35,000 partially insured.

The strike of the through brakemen on the Monongahela Division of the Pennsylvania Railroad, was settled Friday, the men accepting the proposition of the officials for a slight advance.

The bid of Alfred Balfour, of Philadelphia, 5 7-10 cents per pound, was the lowest received at the Treasury Department for the furnishing of 500,000 pounds of paper for printing internal revenue stamps.

Peter Edward Davis, who on September 19 last murdered his paramour's husband by shooting him through the heart, was hanged at Belleville, Ontario, at 8 o'clock Friday morning. He declared his innocence to the last.

Chicago is made up of 325,000 Germans, 150,000 Irish, 90,000 Poles, 40,000 Scandinavians, 45,000 Bohemians, 13,000 Italians, 1,000 Chinese and a few Americans. It is mentioned as being strictly an international city.

Married at Daybreak.

New York Herald. COLUMBIA, S C, June 19.—One of the most romantic weddings in high life ever celebrated in this State took place in Greenville yesterday.

Two years and a half ago Guy Harris, a youth of sixteen, the son of the merchant prince of the city of Spartanburg, eloped with Miss Susie Walker, the very pretty fifteen year old daughter of Colonel James Walker, ex-Mayor of the town and president of the principal bank...

Colonel Walker objected to the marriage on account of the youth of the contracting parties and took his daughter North, and when she returned she again entered society as a popular young lady. Col Walker declared the marriage illegal on account of the young people being under age but young Harris has considered himself legally married.

Yesterday morning, just before day light, Miss Walker, accompanied by lady friends left her father's house, met Harris in an appointed place and arrived in Greenville an hour later. Here the young people were for the second time married, but this time by a minister of the Gospel, who had been a fellow passenger.
