A Tremendous Crowd on the Grounds Today.

A LARGE NUMBER OF ADDITIONAL EXHIBITS AND THE SHOW A PERFECT SUCCESS.

The fair is now an assured success. The weather continues beautiful and the attendance is fully up to expectations. Every incoming train during the day has brought in large crowds and the attendance on the grounds was estimated at from five to eight thousand. The streets are alive with people and the outlook for the most successful exhibition for a number of years is assured. It can be said, however, that every department is well represented, both as to quality and quantity. In fact the exhibition is far above the average in all respects.

The exhibit of blankets from the woolen mills, at Mr. Airy, is the finest of the kind ever made, and is attracting special attention. THE OLD NORTH STATE.

Monroe Register: The sweet potato crop is abundant, 'possums are plentiful.

La Grange Spectator: We have noticed recently in driving through the surrounding country numbers of fields of cotton perfectly white and not a pound has been picked from them.

Statesville Landmark: James Poe, colored, killed on the farm of Col. W. A. Eliason, two miles west of town, one day last week, an American bald eagle which measured 5 feet 2 inches from tip to tip.

The Fife meetings at Randleman closed Sunday. The people showed their appreciation of the Evangelist's work by presenting him with a purse of \$607. There were about 500 conversions during the meeting.

Last Saturday Mr. Almond Bosworth, an aged citizen of Stanly county, who lived about six miles north of Norwood, met his death in tragic manner. He was making sorghum molasses, and while attending to the mill his head was caught between the frame of the mill and the lever, or sweep, to which the horse was attached. His head was crushed and death ensued in about fifteen minutes.—Monroe Register.

Evidences of State Prosperity.

Oxford Day: The Oxford Knitting Mills will begin about the middle of next week. A number of white girls have been already engaged, and Thos. Winston, superintendent, advertises for thirty five more.

Tarboro Banner: The cotton mill is now running again. Much of the machinery has been moved to different parts of the factory. A new boiler (100 h. p.) has been added, now making three. Seven carding machines, now nearly ready for work, have been put in. Also 2,000 spindles and 2,500 twisters. The mill now has 56 carders, 800 spindles and 4,000 twisters and all other necessary machines. The main shafting is 410 feet long.

Henderson Gold Leaf: The Wm. H. S. Burgwyn & Co., tobacco manufacturing concern has been merged into a corporation called the Burgwyn Bros. Tobacco Co., with \$250,000 capital, all subscribed, with privilege of increasing to \$500,000. Col. Wm. H. S. Burgwyn is president and general manager. The company will manufacture both chewing and smoking tobacco.

High Point Enterprise: A visit to the chair factory this week convinced us that this is one of the best plants in our city. All of the machinery is busy turning out rounds and backs, and next week workmen will begin to put them together. The proprietors propose to put a superior chair on the market for the money, and one that will suit the trade.

Danbury Post: Prof. Atkins showed us some fine specimens of iron ore this week, a new discovery; says it seems to be an overflow of the formation, the indications are that it is from a large deposit. It now begins to look as if what Prof. Smith said was true, that just north of Piedmont Springs is the centre of values in the magnetic iron ore zone.

The Colored Fair.

W. C. Coleman, of Concord, who is the wealthiest colored man in the State, and who always takes a deep interest in the welfare of the colored people, is in the city today in the interest of the colored State Fair, to be held at Raleigh on the 21st to the 24th of this month. The colored military company of Charlotte will be there. The posters say: "The people of the State are invited by the North Carolina Industrial Association to be present on the days above named and witness the great event, the Negro Fair. Fine stock and farm products of every kind. Come and bring with you everything made or grown by yourself to show to the world what the negro is doing in this State."—Charlotte News.
