Subsequently a brother of Helsey attempted to shoot Dixon, when the latter also killed him. Dixon has the sympathy of the people and the greatest excitement exists.

Private Frank O. Neill, of the U. S. Army died from hydrophobia yesterday at Fort Mepperson.
