A New Southern Route.

Does not the following which we elip from the Richmond Dispatch of the 7th, throw light upon the stopping of the Albemarle and Raleigh Rail Road at Springhope?

"There seems to be coming into view a great through line, the shortest and most direct of all that extend from Richmond to the South, and which will open great possibilities of new markets and sources of trade.

The Seaboord Air Line has done much to build up Norfolk. Richmond may have an opportunity to share to some extent the advantages offered by that system, which is so rapidly extending itself. The system, beginning at Portsmouth extends via V'el don, Raleigh, Hamlet, and Monroe to Athens, Ga., embracing the Rale gh and Gaston, Raleigh and Augusta, Carolina Central and Georgia, Carolina and Northern roads, each having branches which aid in opening up sections rich in cotton, tobacco, corn rice, timber, and naval stores.

The construction of a railway from Richmond directly southward to Ridgeway, on the Raleigh and Gas ton road, would put us in 114 miles of Raleigh For some years there has been graded nearly all the road bed of a line from Ridgeway to Petersburg a distance of about seventy two miles.

The construction of the road from Ridgeway might be influenced by the action of the Atlantic Coast Line. In other words, if the Seaboard Air Line and the Atlantic Coast Line should pool their issues and work in harmony, then the latter road would not build into Raleigh from Springhope, Nash county, and the Seaboard sysdem would not build into Richmond. But if the former road does build to Raleigh the latter's line to Richmond will be a certainty almost and these systems, so long allies, will become entirely separate.

The southern terminus of the Georgia, Carolina and Northern railway to Atlanta is 267 miles, this division being the longest of the Seaboard Air Line. The graling is completed to Athens, 207 miles from Monroe, and considerable grading has been done between Athens and Atlanta, up to a point only fifteen miles from the latter city. By July 1st of next year the grading will be finished and by October trains will be running from Portsmouth to Atlanta in

time for the fall business. Richmond could afford to spend a good deal of money to secure the building of this air line road to Ridgeway, and thus be a terminus of this great system reaching, by the shortest of all routes, the city. of Atlanta, and having south of the latter point a vast southern connection.

It may be said that Richmond has already the Richmond and Danville road. This is true and it gives us great freight facilities, but for Rich mond it is no longer a through passenger line. It has a cut off at Danviile to Lynchburg. But the rea-board system would be in fact a a through line, and would open to Richmond trade possibilities practically unlimited."

The little woman displayed the silver cross, bearing the mystic letters 'I. H. N." and went in the waiting room to see what could be done. Here she found another cross over the heart of another King's Daughter. A short consultation was held-a collection was taken-tickets bought for the distressed woman and children to Winston-lunch baskets emptied into the tiny hands of the hungry children and a letter written and mailed to a lady of Winston who is noted for her deeds of charity.

And all this was done "In His Name," and one poor woman made happy, in less time than it has taken to write it. And we were given the incident with the distinct understanding that no names were to be made

A Poverty Stricken Congressman.
