At the post mortem examination it transpired that the man had taken a dose of cyanide of potassium with suicidal intent. It seems that Clay had for a long time contemplate ed making away with himself, for a letter (dated July 18) addressed to his wife was found upon his person.

"To the best and dearest of women, Marian, my wife," he wrote, "there are times in the life of a man when he is supremely happy. Such has been my lot with you until quite recently. Then comes a downfall such as has befallen me. Since I lost our dear, darling Peep-the life, light and joy of our heart-I have been broken hearted.
