SOUTHERN IMMIGRATION BUREAU

It is of much importance to Raleigh that the final location of the Southern Inte-States Immigration Bureau be secured. Mr. John T. Patrick, who has been at work in its interest from its inception, has made Raleigh his headquarters, while Gen. Chilton, who is the President and head of the organization, has been located in Austin, Texas. Up to the present, it has been seeking to supply a felt need, but somewhat being led by developments in in adopting a course of action or plan of organization, which plan or course was clearly indicated at the Asheville Convention and is now being consummated by arranging for opening up a central headquarters, which headquarters of course will be not only the location of the central office, but the home of the organization. In connection with the central office will be a collection of specimens from each of the Southern States on pormanent exhibition for the inspection of all those who visit the central office for information as to the best points at which to locate South Of course this feature will be its most striking attraction. Each State, it is presumed, will be sufficiently interested to furnish a fair exhibit of its resources, so that a constantly growing museum of the Southern states will furnish an attraction not only to persons interested in selecting Southern homes, but to sightseers of all sorts from all sections as well. In addition to the establishment of this paramount exhibit from the Southern States, and as the first step to secure it. a Southern Inter States exposition is contemplated to be held at the headquarters of this bureau in the near future. This, of course, would be a big thing for Raleighone that it cannot afford to let slip. A State exposition to continue for 30 days, has proven a big thing, but that would be small in importance compared to an exhibition of the 16 Southern States, say for 60 days. Such an exhibition would draw thousands from the North and Northwest to see it, as well as bring about right here in Raleigh a general interchange among the people of the Southern States themselves such as has never taken place in all time before. To secure the location of the head quarters of this bureau at Raleigh, a meeting has been held and a committee appointed to make an appeal to the citizens for such financial aid as may be necessary. There are other points that want it and are willing to bid high for it, but as this has been Mr. Patrick's headquarters, and he has siready established a foundation upon which to build, Raleigh has the best showing if the people will respond at all cheerfully in keeping with the merits of the obj-ct to be accomplished. With the headquarters here, all the advertising done would necessarily place Raleigh first, and we all know something of Mr Patrick's ability as an advertiser. With a grand museum of the products and attractions of the Southern States located at Raleigh, and Raleigh by that time or at an early date, on a great through trunk line from North to South, would not only need, but be obliged to furnish greater hotel accommodations It is to be hoped that the people will appreciate this matter properly and respond liberally.

TO PREVENT BALDNESS.

Men Who sit in the Front row Should Paste This in Their Hats.

"The preservation of the hair and the prevention of baldness is a matter to which I have given considerable attention and thought,' said a barber the other day, "and I have come to the conclusion that all the patent tonics that were ever compounded by my craft are not half as good as a few simple and natural rem edies which a child can make and use. It is, of course, impossible to prevent baldness where it is hereditary, but it can, however, be warded off

"The hair, like every other portion of the human frame, if uncared for will go to waste and eventually drop cut. This is due to a splitting of the ends of the hair, so that the interior oil duct, which nourishes the hair, is exposed and the natural nourishment of the hair runs to waste, overflows upon the head, forming dandruff, which impedes the growth of the hair just as much as the tares among wheat. The best means to prevent this is a strengthening of the hair, and this can be easily accomplished by frequent cutting and the use of salt and water and a little vaseline. Have you ever noticed what bushly hair seafaring men have? I followed the sea for a number of years: I don't remember ever having seen a bald sailor. It is because their hair is in constant contact with the invigorating salt air and is often wet with salt water. A good tonic of salt water should con tain a teaspoonful of salt to a tumbler of water, and should be applied to the hair two of three times a week. The effect at the end of a month will be surprising. If the hair is thoroughly washed once a week with castile soap and the scalp rubbed with vaseline, the hair will not only cease to fall out, and the dandruff disappear, but will actually thicken. Having once got the hair in good condition, vigorous dry brushing and a resort occasionally to the treatment I have described will keep it so. Balzac, the famous French novelist, was a great stickler for brushing and rubbing the hair, and claimed to have warded off baldness for a long time. though he inherited it from both his father and mother. It is alarming how prevalent baldness now is among young men, and I attributed it entirely to the stiff Derby hat now in vogue. The hat impedes the circulation of the blood on the crown of the head and thus shuts off from the hair a large portion of its nourishment. The soft hat is far the best. Now for the next."


A Bridegroom's Hard Luck.
