

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

TWENTY-SECOND DAY.

SENATE.

Met at 11 o'clock, Lieut. Governor Holt presiding.

Prayer by Rev. Dr. Marshall of this city.

Senator Turner submitted a resolution, which was passed, that the time in which any member can explain his vote be limited to two minutes.

The committee on printing reported that they had awarded the public printing to Josephus Daniels, and that he had filed the required bond.

The following bills were introduced: Relative to insurance companies.

To divide the crime of murder into two classes and define the same.

To require banking institutions and private bankers to make returns to the State Treasurer.

The Soldier's Home bill was made the special order for next Wednesday.

CALENDAR.

Bill to incorporate the Charlotte Literary and Library Association, passed 3d reading.

Bill relative to the rate of interest in North Carolina was taken up.

An amendment was offered that certain counties be exempted from the provisions of the bill.

Senator Bellamy took the floor in opposition to the bill, and in reply to certain remarks of Senator Williams who charged that he (Bellamy) advocated measures similar to those of the carpet baggers.

Among the counties proposed to be exempted are New Hanover and Mecklenburg.

Senators Butler, Turner and others addressed the Senate.

A motion was made to commit the bill to the judiciary committee. Adopted.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The House was opened with prayer by Rev. Mr. Denny, of the House:

The following petitions were introduced:

To establish an Industrial School for white girls.

Leave of absence granted Messrs Yancey, Hendrix, Grier, Adams, Whitfield Newsom and Phipps.

The following bills and resolutions introduced.

To allow the juice of apples, grapes, &c to be sold in Granville county.

To exempt a part of Insolvent debtors' crop not exceeding \$25.

In relation to criminal statistics. Passed third reading.

To fund and consolidate the debt of Wilmington.

To consolidate and revise the charter of the town of Salem.

Calendar; To incorporate the N. C. State Co.

The board of Aldermen of the city of Wilmington to convey a lot for an armory and create a reserve corps.

The following bills were reported:

To enable Washington county, to procure a railroad.

To dispose of the unclaimed dead bodies of convicts, passed third reading.

To compromise, commute and settle the State debt, passed third reading.

To incorporate the Carolina and Virginia Railway Company, passed third reading.

Mr. Jones, of Wake, was allowed to introduce bill to allow the Raleigh Bank further time to organize, referred.

Bill to authorize the city of Goldsboro to issue bonds, passed second reading.

To amend the charter of Durham Water Co.

To incorporate the State Volunteer Firemen's Association, passed third reading.

Adjourned till 3 p. m., Monday.
