**Pay in Gold.**

**SOME RESULTS OF RECENT LEGISLATION IN KANSAS.**

TOPEKA, Kan., Feb. 17.—The Alliance legislature passed a resolution advocating free coinage of silver.

All over the State the farmers are now receiving notice from the loan agencies that when their notes fall due they must be paid. There will be no extension. The companies say that the security has been depreciated and made bad because legislation has been proposed that is virtually repudiation.

Other agents say they will loan the money at the old rates of interest on the farms. The proffered assistance is eagerly taken and the notes are signed generally without careful reading. But when they are read there is a clause found which says that the note must be paid in gold. If objection is made to this clause the borrower is told that it must remain or the money will not be forthcoming. They are told that the silver legislation is being initiated by the Kansas legislature and it is necessary for the lenders to protect themselves. The farmers now find that they have bound themselves to pay in gold both principal and interest, and they reason that if the free coinage act becomes a law they will have a premium of from twenty-five per cent. to pay on every dollar.—Asheville Citizen.

**For the South.**

There was a distinguished party of railroad men in Chattanooga, Tenn., on the 16, prominent among whom was Calvin S. Brice who stated that the object of their visit was to look after the Central and South American trade and with Mexico. He said: "We want to see what is necessary to carry out the intention of the international congresses and establish trade between the countries and the reciprocity scheme, and we are completing our arrangements as fast as we can. We have two southern ports, at Brunswick and Mobile, and expect to establish thirteen lines of steamers from them. It is to supply the demand for coal in connection with these lines that we have been looking over the south, but it is not time to reveal all our plans."

**The Transfusion Tuberculosis Cure.**

PARIS, Feb. 17.—Dr. Bernheim continues his successful experiment of the transfusion of blood in cases of tuberculosis. He treated five cases yesterday by this new system. Dr. Bernheim intends to treat purperal hemorrhage by the same method, and is confident that it will prove successful.
