

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

FORTIETH DAY.

SENATE.

Met at 10 o'clock, Lieut. Gov. Holt presiding.

Prayer by Rev. Dr. Nash, of the city.

Reading of journals dispensed with: Several petitions were presented, Among the bills the following were introduced:

To provide stenographers for superior courts.

To authorize commissioners of Wilkes to levy special tax.

To amend the charter of Smithfield. To define the boundary line between Ashe and Alleghany.

In relation to working the public roads.

To increase the school fund of the State.

To prevent stock from running at large in Rutherford county.

Requiring personal representatives to plead statutes of limitation.

To declare the Carolina Construction company a duly incorporated company.

To elect tobacco weighers by the people.

To incorporate Jacksonville, Onslow county.

To incorporate Oak Ridge Institute in Guilford county.

CALENDAR.

Bill to incorporate the Glenville and Gulf Mining company—passed 3d reading.

Bill to incorporate the Statesville Development company—passed 3d reading.

Bill to incorporate the town of "Hubb" in Columbus county—passed 3d reading.

Bill to incorporate the Brunswick, Western and Southern railroad company—passed 3d reading.

Bill to incorporate Autryville in Sampson county—passed 2d reading. (By consent a bill was introduced, making an appropriation for the Columbian Exposition.)

Calendar resumed—Bill to authorize Swain county to issue special tax.

Bill to incorporate New Wilkesboro Land company—passed its 3d reading.

Bill to amend an act relative to the Davis School at La Grange—passed 3d reading.

Bill to declare the Carolina Construction company duly incorporated passed 3d reading.

Bill to authorize the city of New Berne to issue bonds and levy a tax for improvements—passed 2d reading.

Bill to incorporate the Greensboro Street Railway Co.—passed 3d reading.

Bill to incorporate the Cabarrus and Union Railroad company—passed 2d reading.

Bill to establish a Geological Survey appropriating \$10,000—passed 3d reading.

An act for the support of the Agricultural and Mechanical College appropriating \$15,000—passed 3d reading.

Bill to incorporate the Warehouse and Shipping company of Raleigh—passed 3d reading.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Speaker Doughton called the House to order, and Rev. Dr. Nash offered prayer.

Among the bills introduced were

To provide for the election of tax collectors in the various counties.

To establish Burgwyn county.

To incorporate the Marion Banking Company.

To require leaf tobacco weighers in warehouses to be sworn.

To authorize Sheriffs and Treasurers to execute deeds.

To regulate physicians' charges.

To prohibit sale of liquor in two miles of the Falls of Neuse.

To allow incorporated companies to receive subscriptions in less amounts than \$50.

To regulate the sale of liquor on prescription in certain counties.

The bill to create the county of Richlands out of a part of Beaufort came up on the third reading, and failed to pass, ayes 34, noes 66.

A bill giving to the majority of the members of the bar the power to fix the court calendar.

A resolution by Mr. Pritchard providing for the letting of the public printing to the lowest bidder was tabled.

Mr. Pritchard gave notice of a pro-

test on the part of the Republican members.

Bills passed third reading allowing Brunswick, Anson, Yancey and Columbus counties to levy special taxes.

To establish a graded school at Concord.

A resolution was adopted instructing the Senatorial redistricting committee, to apportion the representation in the House of representatives on the basis of population as ascertained by the census of 1890.
