Venetian Village in Lake Michigan.

CHICAGO, ILL., March 9.—The bureau of construction of the World's Columbian Exposition will make a change in the plans for the pier which will run into the lake. Instead of an ornamental casino at the end of the pier a Venetian village will be built. The houses will be reproductions of houses in Venice, built almost on a level with the lake, and will be used as restaurants and resorts. Scores of little steamers and ornamental gondolas will be used to convey the visitors through the Venetian streets, and the gondolas will be manned by crews in holiday attire, costumed after the picturesque manner of the gondoliers of Venice. At night this village will be illuminated.
