THE ENTER-STATES EXPOSITION.

For the information of those who want to know under what authority the Southern Inter-States Bureau are acting, and from what source they derive their powers, we would refer them to chapter 72, page 627 of the laws of 1889.

The organization was chartered by the legislature of that year under the name of the Southern Inter States Exposition Society, under which charter they duly organized and have been at work for some time, maturing arrangements for holding exhibitions and inducing immigration into the south.

Ten Thousand Spindles.
