A SOUTHERN EXPOSITION.

The Baltimore Herald says: An enterprise is about to be inaugurated at Raleigh, N. C., in which Maryland manufacturers and producers ought to be interested.

It will be remembered that the movement of which the Raleigh Exposition is the result began in 1888. That year, in December, after several months of discussion and agitation on the part of the prime movers in the enterprise, a convention met at Montgomery composed of delegates from each of the Southern States appointed by the governors.

Last year a second convention met at Asheville, and there it was determined to establish a permanent museum of Southern industries to serve as an object lesson and an advertisement of what could be produced in the South.

Preliminaries have been settled, the exposition will be opened next October and will be permanent. It is needless to say that Maryland industries ought to be represented at Raleigh.

It is to be hoped that merchants, manufacturers and producers generally will send different articles to Raleigh, and build up there a large and interesting display of Maryland products.
