Mr. Edward Atkinson, of Boston,  
was in Roanoke, Va., Saturday, on  
his return from a visit to a number  
of prominent points in the booming  
South. In conversation with a news-  
paper interviewer Mr. Atkinson said  
that he had traveled entirely around  
the region desired by him as the citus  
of the iron industry of the world,  
and what he had seen had confirmed  
him in his statement that a man

could view the centre of the iron in-  
dustry of the world. "In using that  
expression," said Mr. Atkinson, "I

centre of the population in the Uni-  
ted States. I make this explanation  
that I may not be misunderstood.  
The iron industry will centre in Gan-  
gula at separate points, but this re-  
gion, as I have said before, is to be  
the situs of the iron industry of the  
world.
