NEWS NOTES ABOUT THE CITY.

One of the main objects of the meeting was to define the duties of Mr. Ferrell, the newly appointed Sanitary officer, who will see to it that the regulations are executed in all cases.

A Narrow Escape.

Our esteemed friend, Mr. Joseph Goodwin, of the Register of Deeds office, had a narrow escape from serious injury yesterday. Mr. Goodwin was engaged in taking down some records from a shelf which was made of plank and attached to the wall of the vault. On the shelf were books aggregating in weight over one hundred and fifty pounds. Suddenly the shelf broke loose from the wall, and but for skillful dodging on the part of Mr. Goodwin, the shelf, with the entire weight, would have struck him on the head, perhaps inflicting a serious injury. As it was, he received a considerable wrench in the back, causing much pain.
