## Arrived.

The warrant books for the payment of direct taxes have arrived at the executive office. They are in the usual form, but have a note attached, stating that the party to whom the warrant is paid must sign the same in his own handwriting. If the party cannot write, then the usual "X" mark shall be made in presence of two witnesses, sworn to before a justice of the peace, or the clerk of the court of the county in which the party resides.

It was certainly a great oversight in the General Assembly not to have provided the Governor with more clerical force in view of the additional labor thrown on the Executive Department by the direct taxes. It is a huge job, and surely the Governor should not be required to deviate from the usual routine of his department without extra help. We really think that, under the circumstances, the Governor would be justified in employing extra force. Surely the compensation would be allowed as an act of mere justice.
