Wilmington Star. This week the Confederate pensioners of North Carolina will go into camp in the tents vacated by the State Guard at Camp Fowle.

On the 29th (Wednesday) the camp will be organized, messes arranged, etc., and on Thursday, the 30th, it will be formally opened with religious exercises by Rev. Dr. Carmichael, and an address of welcome by Col. E. D. Hall.

Friday will be the gala day. Senator M. W. Ransom will deliver an address, there will be a concert by the Second Regiment Band, and a general visitation of veterans from all parts of the State.

Maj. Gen. Robert Ransom will be in command of the encampment. He will be here on the 28th.

Col. E. D. Hall has made arrangements for the care and comfort of the pensioners, and will also do all in his power for the entertainment of the visiting veterans, who are invited by the pensioners to camp with the latter.

The occasion will be a notable one. Many Confederate officers are expected, and it is known that many—both officers and privates—are coming from all parts of the State.
