Thi was caused by being two wetks late in shipment, owing to the long season of cool and rainy weather, and when ready for the market it was ove stocked with peaches, pears, \&e. We notice by a trade circular that there arrived in New York in one day last week eighty four car loads of uantities of other fruits.
A great deal of the grapes shipped rom here this season barely paid the expense of packing, shipping and
commissions, and leaves nothing for commissions
